The International Search and Rescue competition (ISAR) was held in St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador this year, helping to mark the 25th anniversary of the Coast Guard Auxiliary in Canada. ISAR provides an opportunity for members of the Canadian and United States Coast Guard Auxiliaries to test their skills and knowledge while allowing for a little friendly competition between the north and south of the 49th parallel.

The competitors were made up of six teams from the United States and six teams from Canada, all vying for the International trophy. Each of the twelve teams consisted



of 4 persons. Of these four people, one member of each team was chosen to be part of an international team. The International teams were made up of 2 American members and 1 Canadian member, or 2 Canadians and 1 American. They participated in 4 events that were considered International events and the Mystery event, in which all teams participated.

It was two days of competition in which all teams exhibited exceptional SAR skills. It should give great comfort to all mariners to know that such competent help is readily available should assistance be required.

he 4th Annual International ISAR competition was hosted by the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary in St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador this year, marking the 25th anniversary of the Auxiliary in Canada. 25 years of volunteer service to the mariners of our province and our country is quite an accomplishment, and it was celebrated in style this year.

ISAR took place from Thursday, September 25th to Sunday, September 28th, but many members from the United States and Canadian teams arrived early, having never been to our fair province before. As is normally the case, the hospitality of Newfoundlanders and Labradorians left a lasting impression upon our visitors.

Registration began on Thursday at the Delta Hotel in St. John's where people from as far as Hawaii and Ireland came to register for the competition. The competitors and judges briefings were held on Friday morning, followed by the ISAR 2003 Opening Ceremonies at the Coast Guard Base in St. John's. The CLB Army band performed and greetings were extended by the Commissioner of the Canadian Coast Guard, Mr. John Adams, the Chief Executive Officer of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary, Mr. Harry Strong, the National Commodore of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, Mr. Bill Edgerton and the Mayor of St. John's, NL, the Honorable Andy Wells. People were also able to tour the new Cormorant helicopter belonging to 103 Rescue Squadron, Gander.

The first afternoon of competition was held at the Coast Guard Base in St. John's. There competitors took part in Dewatering Pump operations, Marlin Spike (international event), Chartwork (international event) and SAR Planning.

Following a day of briefings and competitions, competitors let their hair down at the Meet and Greet Reception held at the Delta Hotel that evening. Visitors participated in a Newfoundland and Labrador traditional Screech-In and were entertained by local band the Masterless Men. It was not a very late night, however, for the buses heading to the Royal Newfoundland Yacht Club for the second day of competition were leaving the next morning at 0800.

It was a beautiful day in Conception Bay South for the second day of competitions. The events began at 0900 and included Heaving Line Skills competitions, Water Rescue and a Mystery Event. The Mystery Event mimicked a ship abandonment and all competitors, including the International teams, competed. One of the highlights of the day was a SAR hoisting exercise between 103 Rescue Squadron's Cormorant helicopter and the CCG Sir Wilfred Grenfell.

The 2003 International SAR Skills Competition concluded with a banquet at the Delta Hotel for all participants, volunteers to the competition and many invited guests. There the trophies for each event were awarded and Team Newfoundland and Labrador was bestowed the title "International Champions".

Congratulations to Team Newfoundland and Labrador, all participants and ISAR organizers for a job well done. Many thanks to the CCGA Board of Directors, the CCG Support staff and all volunteers of the Canadian Coast Guard and 103 Rescue Squadron, Gander who came out to help put off an amazing event. It should be truly difficult to top ISAR 2003 hosted by Newfoundland and Labrador.

If you do not receive the proper authorization, you are not entitled to any reimbursement, and more importantly, you are liable for any damage done to your vessel.

Remember to notify the Maritime Rescue Sub-Center and obtain an Incident Number. It is for your own protection.


At our 25th Annual General Meeting banquet held in St. John's on November 8, 2003, we honoured

DID YOU KNOW?

The current CCGA Insurance Policy includes two age exclusions. The Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary has attempted to purchase insurance coverage that would not have these exclusions but no insurance company will provide coverage.

The first exclusion affects CCGA members aged 65 years or older. Under the insurance policy, CCGA members 65 years or older are not covered if they suffer a Heart or Circulatory Malfunction during any authorized CCGA activity.

Heart or Circulatory Malfunction coverage applies only if the following conditions are met:

- The Heart or Circulatory Malfunction of the Insured Person occurs within twenty-four (24) hours of participating in a tasking authorized by the Policy Holder; and
- The Insured Person is under sixty-five (65) years of age on the date of such Heart or Circulatory Malfunction; and
- The first symptom of Heart or Circulatory Malfunction is medically diagnosed within twenty-four (24) hours of such participation; and
- Within two (2) years prior to the date of such participation, the Insured Person:
 - i) has not been medically diagnosed with a Heart or Circulatory Malfunction; or
 - ii) has not been receiving any medication or treatment for a Heart or Circulatory Malfunction

Basically what this means is that if a Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary member is 65 years of age or older, there is no Heart or Circulatory Malfunction coverage for them.

The second exclusion is that CCGA members aged 70 years or older are not covered by the Permanent Total Disability Benefit if they should become permanently and totally disabled during any authorized CCGA activity.

Permanent Total Disability means that Accidental Body Injuries sustained in a covered Accident solely and directly:

Prevent the Insured Person from performing all the substantial and material duties of the Insured Person's occupation; and

Cause a condition which is medically determined, by a Physician approved by the Company, to be of continuous and indefinite duration; and

Require the continuous care of a Physician, unless the Insured Person has reached his/her maximum point of recovery; and

Prevent the Insured Person from engaging in any gainful occupation for which the Insured Person is qualified, or could be qualified, by reason of education, training, experience, or skill during and immediately after the Elimination Period.

This insurance does not apply to persons age seventy (70) or older. CCGA members age 70 or older are not covered by the Permanent Total Disability benefit if they become totally and permanently disabled during an authorized CCGA activity.

It is important to note that these two age exclusions are only for these two benefits and that all members, regardless of age, are insured by the other CCGA insurance coverages.

In light of these exclusions, it is recommended that all CCGA members 65 or older consider whether they wish to continue participating in authorized search and rescue operations or other CCGA activities. As well, it is recommended that these members consult with their doctors to ensure that they are medically fit to participate in search and rescue operations and other CCGA activities.

In 2003, there were approximately 145 hours spent on Search and Rescue cases that were not claimed by Auxiliarists.

It is the responsibility of the members to keep accurate data on SAR cases and submit their incident claim forms in a timely manner.

Incident report forms must contain precise times and as many details as can be recorded to ensure timely processing and accurate payment of the claim.

DID YOU KNOW?

The CCGA (NL) Office in St. John's must have an upto-date copy of your vessel's Canadian Steamship Inspection (CSI) certificate. All vessels that become delinquent in their CSIs are flagged in the Search and Rescue System and are considered unavailable for tasking.

If your vessel has been flagged and it participates in an incident, you will not be eligible for compensation, and more importantly, your vessel will not be covered by insurance should it incur damages.

You will be notified that your vessel is unavailable for Search and Rescue. Upon receipt of this notification, please forward a copy or your current CSI or notify the office in St. John's of any delays so that your vessel is not removed from the SAR system permanently.

The CCGA (NL) was responsible for prosecuting 38% of Newfoundland and Labrador's search and rescue incidents, and as well, 2003 marked the 25th anniversary of the CCGA all across Canada. For 25 years, the mariners on the waters of Newfoundland and Labrador have had the comfort of knowing the Coast Guard Auxiliary was there to provide assistance in times of need.

The CCGA (NL) hosted the 4th International Search and Rescue competition in 2003, and we were made proud by Team Newfoundland and Labrador. Not only did they take four of seven events, they won the title of International Champions. Competitors came from all over Canada and the United States and despite being impressed with the skill shown by our team, they were also impressed with the hospitality shown to them by Newfoundlanders and Labradorians in general. ISAR 2004 will be held in Portsmouth, Virginia, USA. We will be represented by a team from District 2 (Northern Peninsula) and I am sure they will make us proud.

It was a busy year for the CCGA (NL) Inc. Aside from hosting ISAR 2003 in September, the 25th Annual General Meeting and Banquet was held in St. John's in November where thirty-six 10 year members

and six 25 year members were invited to receive membership awards. Membership increased to 1035. 190 Auxiliarists received St. John Ambulance Marine Advance First Aid training, 56 Pleasure Craft Operator Cards were issued, 27 Courtesy Vessel Examinations were performed and 55 CCGA briefings were conducted for new members. Auxiliarists spent approximately 1350 hours on task in 2003.

DID YOU KNOW?

An auxiliary vessel <u>MUST</u> be under the command of a member of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary (ie owner or alternate skipper) before accepting a tasking from the Marine Rescue Sub-Centre. It is imperative that the Rescue Centre be informed if no qualified Auxiliarist is onboard the vessel at the time of a request for tasking.

It is a commonly mistaken belief that because a vessel is registered with the Coast Guard Auxiliary, it automatically implies that the crew onboard can prosecute a Search and Rescue incident. This is not true. Upon acceptance of a vessel into the CCGA, the owner/operator designates an alternate skipper. This skipper is deemed to have the proper qualifications to operate the vessel, in accordance with the rules and regulations set by Transport Canada. If a qualified Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary skipper is not onboard a vessel at the time of an incident, the tasking must be refused.

If a vessel accepts a tasking without a qualified Auxiliary member onboard, the vessel would not be reimbursed for the incident. More importantly, there would be no insurance coverage if damages were to occur during the prosecution of the incident.

Please remember, before accepting a tasking from the Marine Rescue Sub-Centre on behalf of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary, advise the Rescue Centre if there is no qualified Auxiliarist onboard.



DID YOU KNOW?

It is the responsibility of the CCGA owner/operator to report to your regional Coast Guard Representative any damage or suspected damage incurred to your vessel immediately following the conclusion of a Search and Rescue incident. In addition, if damage occurs during a SAR case, every effort should be made to notify the Maritime Rescue Sub-Center (MRSC) of the damage, especially if the safety of the CCGA vessel and its crew is jeopardized. MRSC must be notified so they can monitor the progress of the CCGA vessel to ensure it reaches port safely.

The owner/operator must complete a "Collision, Wreck and Injury form and submit it to the CCGA Office in St. John's.
