SAR SKILLS '99

The second annual Search And Rescue Skills Competition was held on October 02, 1999 at the Royal Newfoundland Yacht Club in Conception Bay South. A team represented each of the 10 regional districts in a contest that included six Search and Rescue events as follows:-

- 1. First Aid evaluation of the team's ability to assess an accident scene;
- Line Throwing assessment of the team's ability to throw a heaving line at a stationary, floating target;
- 3. Search Operations team's were to organize, prosecute, and resolve a Search and Rescue incident;
- 4. Chartwork demonstration of each team's basic chartwork skills;
- Search and Rescue Pump Operation evaluation of the accuracy and speed in which each team could operate a de-watering pump, and
- Courtesy Vessel Inspections assessment of the team's ability to thoroughly conduct a vessel examination.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary (CCGA) Newfoundland Inc. celebrated its 21st year of successful operation at its Annual General Meeting in St. John's, October 1-2, 1999. We held our second search and rescue SAR Skills competition which was again a tremendous success. We are looking forward to a national competition being held in Quebec in the Fall of 2000.

During the dinner there were a number of members presented with 10-Year Membership Awards. As well, awards were presented to the winners in the different competitions. I personally congratulate these members and their families

CCGA (N) Inc. increased membership in 1999 to 836 members, with 405 vessels valued at 156 million dollars supporting the Search and Rescue program in Newfoundland and Labrador. The Auxiliary responded to 230 SAR incidents, representing 36% of all SAR incidents in the province.

1999 was our first year with our own Operations/Training Officer, which proved to be a great success. With his help and the support of the Canadian Coast Guard support staff, we were able to train approximately 100 members with Standard First Aid, and inspect 85% of our boats under 15GRT. We hope to do the remaining 15% during the winter and spring. I want to thank our Operations/Training Officer Ed Bruce and the CCG support staff for this accomplishment.

Again I would like to remind you an organization is only as strong as its members; therefore you, the members, have the right to be proud of the Auxiliary. I personally congratulate you and thank you and your families for your continued contribution to such a worthy cause. I too am proud to be a member, and more especially to be your President.

Thank you to the Executive, Directors and Coast Guard Staff for their continued contribution to the success of the Auxiliary. With all of us working together, the CCGA (N) Inc. will continue as a strong and effective organization helping our fellow man for many years to come.

TO ALL AUXILIARISTS:

Many of you have been members of the CCGA for a number of years, but may not have a full understanding of the size and effectiveness of this valuable organization in the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador. I would like to take a moment to share some 1999 statistics with you:

- ☐ There are 836 members and 405 vessels, with a total declared value of \$155.6 million, in the CCGA in Newfoundland and Labrador.
- ☐ In 1999, CCGA vessels responded to 230 maritime SAR incidents and spent 1528 hours on the water engaged in SAR operations. This equates to approximately 36% of all maritime SAR incidents that were prosecuted by Newfoundland Region in this year.
- ☐ The cost of CCGA SAR operations in 1999 was \$190,000.

From the above, one can easily see that the CCGA is a valuable and highly effective member of "Team SAR" and you should be proud to be a member of an organization that is committed to its volunteers, committed to team-work and committed to assisting their fellow mariners in peril on the high seas.

Likewise, the Canadian Coast Guard is also committed to building on its partnership with the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary. The CCGA is a valued member of the "Team" and we thank you for the important contribution that you make to the Maritime SAR Program in Newfoundland and Labrador.

SARSCENE 99 was the eighth annual search and rescue workshop hosted by the National Search and Rescue Secretariat (NSS). It was held October 13-17 in St. John's. A record 702 participants from across North America, Europe and Asia enjoyed the opportunity to share their knowledge and experience with members of volunteer, provincial/territorial and federal SAR organizations.

SARSCENE 99 was the setting for a Joint Canadian Coast Guard and Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary National Council meeting, as well as a tradeshow featuring 45 booths representing a wide variety of SAR services, products and companies. One of the highlights of the tradeshow was the static display and information booth provided by the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary (Newfoundland) Incorporate and the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary.

SARSCENE 99 was not all work and no play. To officially welcome all participants to Newfoundland, a mass "Screech-In" was held, hosted by our own Harry Strong, Chief Executive Officer of the CCGA National Council. QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

DOES AN AUXILIARIST HAVE TO COMPLETE A TASKING RIGHT AWAY?

No. As an Auxiliarist you have the right to refuse a tasking if you believe the response is beyond the capability of your vessel or crew. You also have the right to delay your response to a tasking if you wish. For example, if you are tasked in good weather to tow a vessel. that is not in immediate danger, to the nearest safe haven and you have one more fleet of nets to haul, or string of pots, you do have the option to haul your nets or pots before you proceed to assist the vessel. You must inform the Marine Rescue Sub-Centre in St. John's of your intention to haul your gear before you respond to the tasking. It would be advisable to provide the Rescue Centre with your estimated departure for the disabled vessel.

COAST GUARD CHANGE CONTACT STAFF IF SHOULD I SUPPORT

Yes. If you sell your vessel and acquire a new one and you wish to enroll your new vessel into VESSEL? the Auxillary you must notify the office and complete a new application on your new vessel. When the new information is received on your vessel it is entered into the database at the Marine Rescue Sub-Centre at St. John's. This will enable you to be reimbursed and ensures insurance coverage if in the case of an accident whilst on authorized activity.

SHOULD AN AUXILIARIST SEND IN AN INCIDENT REPORT FORM?

Yes. Completing an incident report form is the initiating step for an Auxiliarist to be reimbursed for an incident tasking. Without the completed incident report form we cannot initiate payment to the member for services If assistance is required in completing this form please call our toll free

WHAT DO I DO IF I CHANGE

Vessels enrolled in the CCGA must be skippered by an auxiliary member in order to be entitled to insurance coverage and reimbursement if tasked on an incident. If you change skippers at any time please notify the office in St. John's to have the new skipper enrolled in the CCGA to ensure coverage.

SHOULD AN AUXILIARIST SEND **IN A VOTING FORM?**

The ten district directors Yes. represent the CCGA members in their district. They are elected by those members who return their voting forms. To have a say in who you would like to represent you at the Annual General meeting, and other functions, you should return your voting form before the deadline date.
